

Who is Eligible for Concurrent Enrollment

The high school student who wants an advanced academic or vocational experience should consider concurrent enrollment at SBVC.

Admission decisions are made based on the academic grade point average, grades in prior classes, test scores, and other factors. The rules of eligibility differ for classes that are academic in nature and those that are vocational or technical.

Academic Classes

Academic classes are transferable to four-year universities. Generally, courses numbered 100 and above are considered to be academic (for example, Psychology 100). Academic classes are limited to high school juniors and seniors with an academic GPA of approximately 3.0, and good grades in similar high school courses.

Vocational/Technical Classes

Vocational classes prepare students for employment in a specific trade or occupation. These classes are available to 9th through 12th graders with a 2.0 GPA, and good grades in similar classes.



When to Apply

Your application materials must be submitted to SBVC Admissions at least 2 weeks before the beginning of the class. English and Math classes have pre-requisites, so please allow an extra week to schedule and take the College Assessment Test. You will be notified of your status by telephone.

How to Apply

You must submit the following materials to the SBVC Office of Admissions at least two weeks before the requested class begins:

- SBVC Application for Admission
- High School Concurrent Enrollment Petition
- Youth Emergency Contact Card
- Official High School Transcript

State regulations require that concurrently enrolled high school students must reapply each term they wish to return to SBVC. Forms are available at <http://www.valleycollege.edu/admissions/highschool>

Costs

The San Bernardino Community College District waives enrollment fees for concurrently enrolled high school students who are residents of the State of California. You are responsible for all other fees, textbooks and supplies. Visit www.valleycollege.edu for current fees.

Frequently Asked Questions

- **Do all students get accepted?**
Each application is carefully reviewed, and because we want your first college experience to be successful, we only accept students who have adequate preparation to work at the college level.
- **Will I get high school credit?**
You will earn college credit. You should check with your high school to see if they will accept this credit toward your high school requirements.
- **What classes can I take?**
You must meet eligibility requirements to take an academic or vocational class at SBVC. You must meet pre-requisites for courses that have them. You will only be able to enroll in those classes for which you have your principal's or his/her designee's permission.
- **Do I have to live near SBVC?**
No, but you are responsible for your own transportation to and from class.

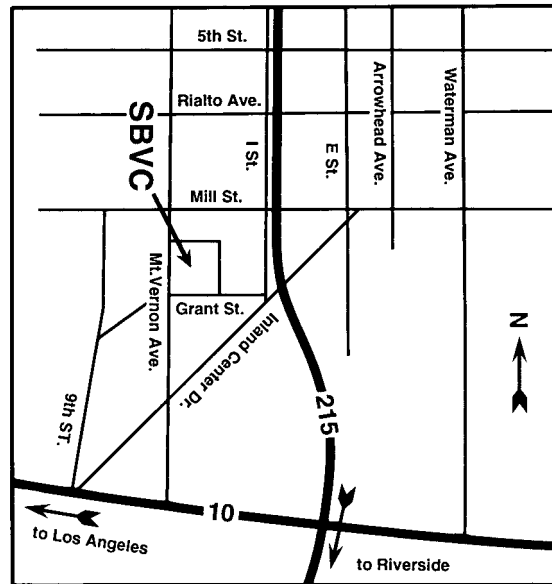


To Parents

Just like you, we want your child's first experience with college to be a successful one. And one of the most important factors will be your support. Toward that end, it is helpful to be aware of some of the differences between high school and college.

- Attendance will not be monitored in the same way as high school. If your student doesn't attend regularly, no one will call you.
- Courses are designed for adult students, and may contain adult content.
- You will not have access to your child's grades or records without their written consent.
- Typically, instructors are not available for parent conferences.
- Your student will have access to the Student Health Center, where they will have reproductive and many other health services available to them.
- College textbooks can be quite expensive. If you choose to purchase them any place besides the SBVC Bookstore, be sure you are purchasing the correct edition of the correct book.
- While SBVC has one of the best safety records of any college in the Inland Empire, your child will be a minor in an adult environment. They should exercise caution at all times.
- Your student will be responsible for all homework, papers and assignments. If they are having difficulty, they should speak with the instructor before or after class, or during the instructor's office hours.
