# BP 5050 STUDENT SUCCESS AND SUPPORT PROGRAM

(Replaces current SBCCD BP 5050)

### From current SBCCD BP 5050 titled Matriculation

Student Success for San Bernardino Community College District students means more than just obtaining degrees, transfer, certificate, or career advancement. It also means the achievement of the individual student's self-established educational goals including completing a specific course, program, career and/or technical education to maximize the skills necessary to fer becomeming a better person, worker, and/or citizen. Student Success is not merely an outcome, but also a process. It's a journey that encompasses multiple levels of achievement and milestones such as the abilities to: analyze, synthesize, and evaluate information; effectively communicate with others; achieve proficiency in subjects including science, mathematics, computer/technical skills, world languages, history, geography, and global awareness; collaboratively work in culturally diverse settings; be leaders who see projects through to completion; be responsible decision makers who are self-motivated; be active civic participants; and be ethical individuals who are committed to their families, communities, and others. Student Success is everyone's responsibility demonstrated through role modeling, support, opportunity, equity, and social justice.

(a) The purpose of the Seymour-Campbell Student Success Act of 2012 is to 110 increase California community college student access and success by providing 111 effective core matriculation services, including orientation, assessment and 112 placement, counseling, and other education planning services, and academic 113 114 interventions. The focus of the Seymour-Campbell Student Success Act of 2012 is on the entering students' transition into college in order to provide a 115 foundation for student achievement and successful completion of students' 116 educational goals, with a priority toward serving students who enroll to earn 117 degrees, career technical certificates, transfer preparation, or career 118 advancement. The Seymour-Campbell Student Success Act of 2012 targets 119 state resources on core matriculation services that research has shown to be 120 critical in increasing the ability of students to reach their academic and career 121 goals. By focusing funding in these core areas and leveraging the use of 122 technology to more efficiently and effectively serve a greater number of 123 students, the goal of the Seymour-Campbell Student Success Act of 2012 is to 124 provide students with a solid foundation and opportunity for success in the 125 California Community Colleges. 126 (b) Any college or district receiving funding under this article shall agree to 127 carry out its provisions as specified, but shall be bound to that agreement only 128 for the period during which funding is received pursuant to this article. The 129 obligations of the college or district under the agreement shall include, but not 130 be limited to, the expenditure of funds received pursuant to this article for only 131

132 those services approved by the board of governors and the contribution toward

133 the purposes of this article of matching funds as the board of governors may

require pursuant to Section 78216.

## 137 <u>78212.</u>

- 138 (a) (1) For purposes of this article, "matriculation" means a process that brings 139 a college and a student into an agreement for the purpose of achieving the 140 student's educational goals and completing the student's course of study. The 141 142 agreement involves the responsibilities of both parties to attain those objectives through the college's established programs, policies, and requirements including 143 those established by the board of governors pursuant to Section 78215. 144 (2) The institution's responsibility under the agreement includes the provision of 145 student services to provide a strong foundation and support for their academic 146 147 success and ability to achieve their educational goals. The program of services funded through the Seymour-Campbell Student Success Act of 2012, which 148 shall be known and may be cited as the Student Success and Support Program, 149 shall include, but are not necessarily limited to, all of the following: 150 (A) Orientation services designed to provide to students, on a timely basis, 151 information concerning campus procedures, academic expectations, financial 152 assistance, and any other matters the college or district finds appropriate. 153 (B) Assessment before course registration, as defined in Section 78213. 154 (C) Counseling and other education planning services, which shall include, but 155 not necessarily be limited to, all of the following: 156 (i) Counseling and advising. 157 (ii) Assistance to students in the exploration of educational and career interests 158 and aptitudes and identification of educational objectives, including, but not 159 limited to, preparation for transfer, associate degrees, and career technical 160 education certificates and licenses. 161 (iii) The provision of information, guided by sound counseling principles and 162 practices, using a broad array of delivery mechanisms, including technology-163 based strategies to serve a continuum of student needs and abilities, that will 164 enable students to make informed choices. 165 (iv) Development of an education plan leading to a course of study and 166 guidance on course selection that is informed by, and related to, a student's 167 academic and career goals. 168 (D) Referral to specialized support services as needed and available, including, 169
- but not necessarily limited to, federal, state, and local financial assistance;

- health services; career services; veteran support services; foster youth 171
- services; extended opportunity programs and services provided pursuant to 172
- Article 8 (commencing with Section 69640) of Chapter 2 of Part 42 of Division 173
- 174 5; campus child care services provided pursuant to Article 4 (commencing with
- Section 8225) of Chapter 2 of Part 6 of Division 1 of Title 1; programs that 175
- teach basic skills education and English as a second language; and disabled 176
- student services provided pursuant to Chapter 14 (commencing with Section 177
- 67300) of Part 40 of Division 5. 178
- 179 (E) Evaluation of each student's progress and referral to appropriate
- interventions for students who are enrolled in basic skills courses, who have not 180
- declared an educational goal as required, or who are on academic probation, as 181
- defined by standards adopted by the Board of Governors of the California 182
- Community Colleges and community college districts. 183
- (3) The student's responsibilities under the agreement include, but are not 184 necessarily limited to, the identification of an academic and career goal upon 185
- application, the declaration of a specific course of study after a specified time 186
- period or unit accumulation, as defined by the board of governors, diligence in 187
- class attendance and completion of assigned coursework, and the completion of 188
- courses and maintenance of academic progress toward an educational goal and 189
- course of study identified in the student's education plan. To ensure that 190
- students are not unfairly impacted by the requirements of this chapter, the 191
- board of governors shall establish a reasonable implementation period that is 192
- phased in as resources are available to provide nonexempt students with the 193 core services pursuant to this section. 194
- (b) Funding for the Student Success and Support Program shall be targeted to 195
- fully implement orientation, assessment, counseling and advising, and other 196
- education planning services needed to assist a student in making an informed 197
- decision about his or her educational goal and course of study and in the 198
- 199 development of an education plan.

(a) No district or college may use any assessment instrument for the purposes 204 of this article without the authorization of the board of governors. The board of 205 governors may adopt a list of authorized assessment instruments pursuant to 206 the policies and procedures developed pursuant to this section and the intent of 207

- 208 this article. The board of governors may waive this requirement as to any
- 209 assessment instrument pending evaluation.
- (b) The board of governors shall review all assessment instruments to ensure
- 211 that they meet all of the following requirements:
- 212 (1) Assessment instruments shall be sensitive to cultural and language
- 213 differences between students, and shall be adapted as necessary to
- 214 accommodate students with disabilities.
- (2) Assessment instruments shall be used as an advisory tool to assist studentsin the selection of appropriate courses.
- 217 (3) Assessment instruments shall not be used to exclude students from
- 218 admission to community colleges.
- (c) The board of governors shall establish an advisory committee to review and
- 220 make recommendations concerning all assessment instruments used by districts 221 and colleges pursuant to this article.
- (d) For purposes of this section, "assessment" means the process of gathering
- information about a student regarding the student's study skills, English
- language proficiency, computational skills, aptitudes, goals, learning skills,
- 225 career aspirations, academic performance, and need for special services.
- Assessment methods may include, but not necessarily be limited to, interviews,
- 227 standardized tests, attitude surveys, vocational or career aptitude and interest
- inventories, high school or postsecondary transcripts, specialized certificates orlicenses, educational histories, and other measures of performance.

- (a) All participating districts shall, with the assistance of the chancellor,
- establish and maintain institutional research to evaluate the effectiveness of the
- 236 Student Success and Support Program described by this article and of any other
- 237 programs or services designed to facilitate students' completion of their
- 238 educational goals and courses of study.
- (b) The metrics for this research shall include, but not be limited to:
- 240 (1) Prior educational experience, including transcripts when appropriate, as
- 241 determined by the chancellor.
- 242 (2) Educational goals and courses of study.
- 243 (3) Criteria for exemption from orientation, assessment, or required counseling
- 244 or advisement, if applicable.
- 245 (4) Need for financial assistance.

- (5) Disaggregated data by ethnicity, gender, disability, age, and socioeconomicstatus, to the extent this information is available.
- 248 (6) Academic performance, such as the completion of specified unit thresholds,
- 249 success in basic skills courses, grade point average, course completion
- outcomes, transfer readiness, and degree and certificate completion.
- 251 (7) Any additional information that the chancellor finds appropriate.
- 252 (c) The evaluation provided for by this section shall include an assessment of
- the effectiveness of the programs and services in attaining at least the followingobjectives:
- (1) Helping students to define their academic and career goals and declare acourse of study.
- (2) Assisting institutions in the assessment of students' educational needs and
- valid course placement.
- (3) Helping support students' successful course completion and goal attainment.

- (a) The Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, in

- 269 and to develop education plans.
- 270 (2) Exempting students from participation in orientation, assessment, or
- 271 required education planning services under this article.
- 272 (3) Requiring community college districts to adopt a student appeal process.
- (b) To ensure that students are not unfairly impacted by the requirements of
- this chapter, these policies and processes shall be phased in over a reasonable
- period of time as determined by the board of governors in consideration of theresources available to provide the core services identified in Section 78212.
- (c) It is the intent of the Legislature that these policies and processes be

- (a) The Legislature recognizes that community college districts are currently
- 287 funding various components of student matriculation through existing
- orientation, counseling and advising, education planning, assessment, and other
- 289 student services, but that adequate student matriculation and implementation
- of the Student Success and Support Program strategies cannot be realizedwithout supplemental funding support.
- (b) The board of governors shall develop a formula for allocating the funding for
- 293 the Student Success and Support Program to implement the services identified
- in Section 78212 at community colleges. The formula shall include the
- requirement that the districts or colleges contribute matching funds in an
- amount to be established by the board of governors in each case, and shall
- 297 reflect, but not be necessarily limited to, other considerations as follows:
- 298 (1) The number of students to receive services at each college.
- (2) The number of students who received orientation, assessment, counselingand advising, and other education planning services.
- 301 (3) The requirement that funds for the Student Success and Support Program
- 302 services be expended only for services approved by the board of governors.
- 303 (4) The requirement that any district or college receiving funding pursuant to
- 304 this section agree to implement this article, implement the board of governors'
- 305 system of common assessment, if using an assessment instrument for
- placement, and implement the board of governors' accountability scorecard,
   pursuant to Section 84754.5, when established during the period in which it
   receives that funding.
- (5) Insofar as a community college district is able to fully implement in-person
- 310 or technology strategies for orientation, assessment, and education planning
- 311 services, the board of governors may identify other noninstructional support
- 312 services that can be funded through this article.
- 313 (c) The board of governors shall require participating colleges to develop a
- 314 Student Success and Support Program plan that reflects all of the following:
- (1) A description of the Student Success and Support Program servicesidentified in Section 78212 to be provided.
- 317 (2) A description of the college's process to identify students at risk for
- academic or progress probation and the college's plan for interventions or
- 319 services to students.
- 320 (3) The college budget for the state-funded Student Success and Support
- Program services pursuant to Sections 78212 and 78214.

- 322 (4) The development and training of staff and faculty to implement the Student323 Success and Support Program services.
- 324 (5) In multicampus districts, the coordination of the college Student Success
- 325 and Support Program plan with other college plans within the district.
- (6) Technology services and institutional research and evaluation necessary forimplementation of this article.
- 328 (7) Coordination with college student equity plans to ensure that the college has
- identified strategies to monitor and address equity issues and mitigate anydisproportionate impacts on student access and achievement.
- (8) The extent to which the community college is able to develop partnerships
- 332 with feeder high school districts, workforce agencies, and other community
- 333 partners to assist entering students in career and educational exploration and
- planning and leverage resources to support a successful transition to collegeand career.
- (d) The board of governors may allocate up to 5 percent of the total funds
- 337 appropriated for the Student Success and Support Program for state
- administrative operations to carry out the intent of this article, subject to thereview of the annual budget process.

## 349 <u>78219.</u>

- (a) The Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges shall establish
- a common assessment system to be used as one of multiple measures,
- 353 consistent with existing regulations, for the purposes of community college
- placement and advisement. The system shall include all of the followingobjectives:
- 356 (1) Selection of an existing commercially available and centrally delivered
- 357 system of student assessment that provides a single common assessment

- 358 instrument for use by community colleges in the curriculum areas of English, 350 mathematics, and English as a second language
- 359 mathematics, and English as a second language.
- 360 (2) Creation of a secure, centrally housed assessment test data warehouse that361 shall collect all of the following:
- 362 (A) All available assessment scores generated by assessed students at all363 community colleges.
- (B) All available K–12 assessment data for students at all community colleges.
- The use of this data shall be limited to placing and advising community college students to enhance their success with and completion of their postsecondary education objectives.
- 368 (C) Other data or student transcript information that is used for the purpose of 369 student placement.
- 370 (3) Creation of an Internet Web portal that can be accessed by community
- 371 college personnel and students and that provides all of the following:
- 372 (A) An assessment profile, generated for each student upon request, that
- 373 includes all assessment information available in the data warehouse created
- pursuant to paragraph (2). This profile shall be accessible for counseling,matriculation, and course placement purposes.
- (B) A pretest application that emulates the structure of the student assessmentcreated pursuant to paragraph (1) that students can practice on and familiarize
- themselves with before taking future assessments.
- 379 (C) An advisement tool that provides students with information about the
- importance of taking the common assessment to be placed in college-level
- 381 courses in English, mathematics, or English as a second language and the
- historical success rates of students who place in various levels of remedialcoursework.
- (b) In developing the common assessment, the Office of the Chancellor of the
- 385 California Community Colleges shall work in collaboration with the State
- 386 Department of Education and the California State University when developing a
- 387 common college-readiness standard that will be reflected in the creation of388 assessment instruments.
- (c) The Office of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges shallsubmit a report to the Legislature and the Governor on the progress of the
- implementation of the common assessment system by December 31, 2012.
- (d) The provisions of this section shall be operative upon the receipt of state,
- federal, or philanthropic funds sufficient to cover the costs of the commonassessment system.

409 (a) This chapter implements and should be read in conjunction with the provisions of the Seymour-Campbell Student Success Act of 2012, codified as Education Code 410 sections 78210, et seq., which recognizes that student success is the responsibility 411 of the institution and student, supported by well-coordinated and evidence based 412 student and instructional services to foster academic success. The purpose of this 413 subchapter is to implement the Student Success and Support Program to increase 414 California community college student access and success through the provision of 415 416 core matriculation services, including orientation, assessment and placement, counseling, advising, and other education planning services, with the goal of 417 418 providing students with the support services necessary to assist them in achieving their education goal and identified course of study. 419 420 421 (b) The requirements of this subchapter apply only to districts receiving funds pursuant to Education Code section 78216 for the period of time during which such 422 423 funds are received. 424 425 Note: Authority cited: Sections 66700 and 70901, Education Code. Definitions. 454 455 456 For purposes of this subchapter, the following definitions shall apply: 457 458 (a) "Assessment for placement" hereinafter referred to as "assessment" is the process of gathering information about individual students in order to identify their 459 skill level and appropriately direct them to courses for which they are prepared. 460 Information used in the assessment process may include, but is not limited to, 461 information regarding the student's study skills, English language proficiency, 462 computational skills, aptitudes, goals, learning skills, career aspirations, academic 463 performance, and need for special services. Assessment involves the collection of 464 465 such information for purposes of course placement. 466 467 (b) "Assessment test" is a validated, standardized, or locally-developed test used in addition to other measures in the course placement process. 468 469 (c) "Career Goal" is the student's stated occupational interest upon application and 470 471 is periodically updated during the student's continued enrollment at the college. 472 473 (d) "Course of Study" is the student's chosen educational program; major or area of emphasis; or course sequence for transfer preparation, career preparation or 474 advancement, completion of basic skills, or English as a Second Language 475 proficiency to achieve the student's education goal. 476 477 (e) "Disproportionate impact" in broad terms is a condition where access to key 478 resources and supports or academic success may be hampered by inequitable 479 practices, policies, and approaches to student support or instructional practices 480 affecting a specific group. For the purpose of assessment, disproportionate impact 481 482 is when the percentage of persons from a particular racial, ethnic, gender, age, or disability group, who are directed to a particular service or course placement based 483 484 on an assessment test or other measure is significantly different from the 485 representation of that group in the population of persons being assessed, and that discrepancy is not justified by empirical evidence demonstrating that the 486 assessment test or other measure is a valid and reliable predictor of performance in 487 the relevant educational setting. 488 489 490 (f) "Education goal" is the student's stated intent to earn a degree or career technical education certificate, prepare for transfer to a four-year college or 491 university, improve math or English basic skills or English language proficiency, or 492

pursue career advancement or occupational training or retraining, or other 493 494 educational interest. This shall include, but not be limited to, the provision of counseling as required by section 55523. 809 810 811 (b) Districts or colleges shall provide students with an opportunity to develop student education plans that are either: 812 813 814 (1) Abbreviated. Abbreviated student education plans are one to two terms in 815 length designed to meet the immediate needs of students for whom a comprehensive plan is not appropriate; or 816 817 818 (2) Comprehensive. Comprehensive student education plans take into account a 819 student's interests, skills, career and education goals, major, potential transfer institutions, and the steps the student needs to take on their educational path to 820 821 complete their identified course of study. The comprehensive plan helps the student achieve their course of study. The comprehensive plan includes, but is not limited 822 823 to, addressing the education goal and course of study requirements, such as the 824 requirements for the major, transfer, certificate, program, applicable course

The comprehensive student education plan is tailored to meet the 827 individual needs and interests of the student and may include other elements to 828 829 satisfy participation requirements for programs such as EOPS, DSPS, CalWORKs, 830 veterans education benefits, athletics, and others. 831 832 (c) Once a continuing nonexempt student has selected an education goal and 833 course of study, the district shall make a reasonable effort to afford the student the 834 opportunity to develop a comprehensive student education plan describing the responsibilities of the student, the requirements he or she must meet, and the 835 836 courses, programs, and services required and available to achieve the stated goal. 837 (d) The student education plan developed pursuant to subdivision (b) shall be 838 accessible, timely, and recorded in electronic form.
