Hamdy]</li> <li>Updated Mission, Vision, and Values Statement</li> <li>A few months ago, we brought the original mission/vision/values statement in its original format. Some other folks came in to help with the writing process, so after taking this to committees, asking people via email, to take a look at it. We've talked to some student groups.</li> <li>We would like a motion of support for the mission, vision, and values. Now this is different from the Senate approving it because as we go deeper into the educational master plan, there's a possibility that there may be a couple of tweaks to this, but we don't expect that.</li> <li>As we move into the educational master plan's different portions and ask for feedback, give information, and ask for support so everyone is in the loop.</li> <li>o Motion 7</li> <li>b. DSP&amp;S: Name Change [L. Brunson]</li> <li>The DSPS department is changing their name to Student Accessibility Services (SAS).</li> <li>Even before we embarked on this process I was getting emails from faculty and staff asking if we were ever going to change the name. This is in alignment with our diversity, equity, inclusion, and anti-racist work we're doing across the district. I personally believe calling people disabled in the year 2022 is not the way to go.</li> <li>We wanted a name that was more reflective of the services we provide, but one that the students could walk in pride with. We graduate between 70 and 80 students per year and they're able to overcome any challenges they face.</li> <li>To give background, we put together a focus group as a districtwide effort. So this change will be effective for both Valley and Crafton. We walked through several guiding questions. We sent out surveys to both campuses where we received 15 proposed name changes. We narrowed that down to four names and set out a second survey, where we had over 300 responses from the students at both Valley and Crafton. put those web addresses in the chat and please know we're embarking on the very beginnings of this and of course we're starting with the military credit service. Thank you to the Vet Center and all those that evaluate those transcripts. We are looking to update our system to what they call the math program. And then, while we are working on that we are actually looking at parallel systems, then for credit for prior learning for all of our general population and so thank you guys that was quick. So for this semester for right now we are getting training for the evaluators and the and the Vet Center and the evaluators in A&R as well, and then, as we move forward again, you know, just feeling our way through this process, we will then have further collaboration and talks in the fall and then at that point we can even bring in some of our department chairs and those other constituents that are going to be involved in making this successful project. So I'm just going to quickly share my screen real quick here. I know I can go there. That's not what you need to see. Hold on one second. Here we go.

- We have the map program. The Veterans Resource Center from Norco they you know are helping facilitate us in this effort. They have been the I would say initiators of the first programmatic challenges and issues and everything map for our veterans so again they are hosting us and providing us with some training for us as we move forward.
- Then the other website here for the success in a credit for prior learning initiative that's more of the umbrella because right now, although we're concentrating on veterans, that informs what we do locally with regard for the general credit for prior learning so currently the system has been refined. In map will launch and be used for general credit for prior learning at some point, you know those old modification of forms. That we use your credit for prior learning that chairs put through and we get them signed eventually that'll all be in a system where it will not be laborious and it will be driven by the computer so, but in any event that's just a short snippet more to come and I look forward to working with all of you with regard to this initiative, so thank you that's my four minutes, and if there's one last thing I can say, just nothing to do with that, but just a shoutout to all the counselors and everyone open registration for those eight week boot camp math courses we opened it up, we initially have them open for our target populations, the African American students, Valley, etc., but now it's open registration, so against the first time on campus that we've had an eight week boot camp of sorts for 108 and 102 and preschools map, so again, please get those students registered, and with that I'm done.

At Alan Hancock she implemented the college's student equity plan, research and recruitment plans, non-

Some of her recognitions while she was there included future leaders of America, Latino Legacy award from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Pacific Coast Business times 40 under 40, Santa Barbara County commission for women service awards, and the list just goes on and on.</li> <li>N. Ornelas: I'm honored to be here and I appreciate you allowing me to briefly introduce myself. I've heard so much about the district and the campuses and all the great work that's been happening. I appreciate all of the accolades that Chancellor Rodriguez read off. That really was the true work for me, working with the faculty and academic senate, and the support staff and administrators. Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-25-20 on March 12, 2020, Executive Order N-29-20 on March 17, 2020, and signed AB 361 into law on September 16, 2021. Portions of these orders and not now relax parts of the Brown Act under specific conditions. In part, the orders allow elected officials to "attend" a meeting via teleconference WITHOUT having to admit members of the public into the location from which they are participating (N-25-20) and orders that "such a body need not make available any physical location from which members of the public may observe the meeting and offer public comment" (N-29-20). EO N-08-21 extended the permissions for Brown Act bodies to meet virtually through September 30, 2021. The signing of <u>AB 361</u> into law allows for the above conditions to remain in effect through January 1, 2024 as long as specific conditions are in place, the main condition being operating under a State of Emergency.
