

Born and raised in New Orleans, Ken has been involved in the automotive service and repair nearly all of his adult life. His dad was a mechanic for 29 years and his grandfather for 39 years.

Ken actually quit his first mechanic's job after just one week to go to work for a concrete company "and do something different." His first real automotive job was for an American Motors (AMC) dealer. Melancon has worked on 29 different car and truck lines and is a certified master technician for AMC and Chrysler.


DEDICATED FACULTY

LIBRARY AND LEARNING SUPPORT SERVICES

Library Survey

Thank you to the 385 students who participated in our Library Services Survey. A few results:

- 71.6% said they “used a computer” during their visit, making that the most frequent response, followed closely by “checked out a textbook” at 69.5%
- 97% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that “I feel welcome in the library, and comfortable asking staff for help.”
- 93% agreed or strongly agreed that “the resources and/or assistance I received during my visit will help me earn a better grade.”

DISABLED STUDENT PROGRAMS & SERVICES (DSPS)

DSPS is ending the academic year of 2014-15 with our students earning 46 AA degrees, four AS degrees and 28 certificates. Summer is starting off with 288 students enrolled. DSPS has been doing outreach visitation and tours to seniors at our local high schools. These tours and visits inform the students about SBVC and how they can receive supportive services to help them succeed.

ASSOCIATED STUDENT GOVERNMENT (ASG) / OFFICE OF STUDENT LIFE

Associated Student Government held their annual student elections on May 4th, 5th and 6th. Stop by Campus Center 215 to welcome our new officers.



The Office of Student Life hosted the 2015 Commencement Ceremony on May 22nd. Over 400 of our 1,300 grads walked this year.

Inter Club Council held their spring Clash of the Clubs event. SBVC clubs competed to win cash for their club account. First place went to Puente, second place to Alpha Gamma Sigma and third place to the Culinary Arts Club.

STUDENT HEALTH SERVICES

The 2015 Spring Health Fair theme was “Beware the Bees: Blood pressure, Blood sugar, Belly fat, BMI, and Bad food.” Teams created teaching materials with a distinct teaching point and a game or activity to share. Guests included public health, the Highway Patrol, police department, RADD Car (Rockers Against Drunk Drivers), Red Cross Bloodmobile, Human Services and others. About 300 students came to the fair.

At our April Stress Solutions Oasis faculty and staff told us they find the atmosphere to be calming, relaxing and a treat they look forward to.



On the Blue Carpet was celebrated on May 7th and 25 students celebrated their accomplishments for the semester with our hostesses. Many onlookers cheered them on.

STAR PROGRAM

The STAR Program recognized its graduates this month. Over 80% of the STAR grads are transferring to four-year universities. The STAR Program is offering services this summer for continuing program participants.



EOPS/CARE

EOPS/CARE celebrated their End of the Year Dinner at San Manuel Event Center on May 12th. There were about 160 attendees. They were all excited and ready to transfer to their respective universities.

Students have registered for summer.

We have over 400 new applicants who will participate in orientations in June.

CARE students participated in a conference on campus and discussed pertinent issues. They will also receive a grant to assist with their child care.

VALLEY-BOUND COMMITMENT

The End of the Year Dinner was held at San Manuel

Event Center on May 12th. Students have completed over 3,000 hours of community service, including the Nuestra Graduacion, Commencement and Middle School Educational Summit events.

CalWORKs & Workforce Development

CalWORKs & Workforce Development, in collaboration with Associated Student Government, hosted a Job Fair on Tuesday, May 5th in the Business Building Room 100, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Over 200 job seekers engaged with 20 local employers about employment opportunities.

FIRST YEAR EXPERIENCE, VALLEY BOUND COMMITMENT/DREAMERS

Visitors went to high schools in the San Bernardino, Colton and Rialto school districts, speaking with counselors and staff to determine how SBVC can better serve their students.

On April 14th FYE hosted a grand opening for its “Dreamers Resource Center,” serving our AB540 students and the community. Turnout was standing room only.

FYE presented two conferences in April, both geared toward educating students on the benefits of attending SBVC, The Dreamers Conference on April 17th and The Male/Senior Day Conference on April 24th.

FYE is actively recruiting for Valley-Bound and FYE students. Some 230 scholarships were awarded to individuals who met the qualifications for these programs.

FYE held an informational summit May 1st for SBVC campus stakeholders.

ADMISSIONS & RECORDS

Since our last update we have processed 2,655 admission applications for summer 2015 and 1,961 admission applications for fall 2015. Priority registration for fall 2015 begins July 6th. Three staff from admissions and records attended the annual CACCRAO conference to learn about new updates to our upcoming registration cycle. On May 8th the Director and Coordinator attended the quarterly region 9

meeting. Admissions and Records is planning their first annual A&R office retreat for June 18th, an opportunity to discuss the past year's successes and challenges, discuss the upcoming year and coordinate activities to encourage team building and understand each other's strengths. It is our goal this next academic year to streamline more processes and develop more collaborative processes.

ASSESSMENT CENTER

The assessment team has been testing offsite at 17 locations, administering two or three test sessions per location per day, testing over 400 students so far. The assessment center is using ADSS 102 C as an overflow room to keep up with the demands of assessment testing on campus. Arleen attended a region 9 meeting for the Common Assessment Initiative (CAI) on May 11, 2015.

COUNSELING

The Counseling Department hosted the High School Counselors and Career Technicians Conference, attended by 73 participants from neighboring high schools. Featured were academic and student support services, SBVC student achievements and presentations by representatives from CSUSB, UCR and Loma Linda University on milestones of graduates who have transferred to those institutions. Developmental and comprehensive counseling services are being provided to the general population, as are workshops for nursing students and counseling at feeder high schools.

FINANCIAL AID

The Financial Aid Office has disbursed over 17 million in Pell Grant funds to approximately 5,000 students. Additionally, we have paid 1.5 million in Cal Grant funds to approximately 1,500 students. The Financial Aid Office started processing 2015/2016 FAFSA applications on May 4th. Missing information email notifications were sent to students regarding their 2015/2016 FAFSA application status on May 5th. The Financial Aid Office is pleased to announce that as of May 12, 2015 a total of 2,800 student files have been auto-packaged for the 2015/2016 award year. In comparison to last year, as of May 12, 2014 a



total of 50 student files had been packaged for the 2014/2015 award year.

FOSTER SERVICES: GUARDIAN SCHOLARS AND FOSTER AND KINSHIP CARE EDUCATION

Effective May 25, 2015, the department will offer employment workshops to CalWORKs students, WorkAbility III students/clients, Workforce Investment Act (WIA) and Employment Development Department (EDD) students every Monday from 11:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in Business 118. Students will develop resumes and cover letters, receive employment leads; online job search, and learn current workforce trends to enter or re-enter the workforce.



Guardian Scholars will be hosting its first annual conference with a focus to promote and increase greater communication between all groups who support foster youth in pursuing an education and developing life skills.

The Foster & Kinship Care Education Program participated in the annual FKCE Curriculum Institute in April to discuss and develop new curriculum to address the needs of our foster and kinship caregivers. The focus of the institute was to develop training that reduces the further traumatization of children in the child welfare system by improving placement stability and giving caregivers the information they need to help them advocate for children in their care.

VETERANS RESOURCE CENTER

The Veterans Resource center maintains on a perpetual track. As the spring 2015 term comes to a close, it has continued to increase servicing students—1,247 of them since April 16th.

Our educational counselor has seen and provided counseling to 62 veteran students, not counting walk-ins and quick educational plan revisions. The Certifying Official has certified roughly 230 student veterans for educational benefits since the beginning of the spring 2015 semester.

Our mental health counselors have maintained an active student caseload, counseling and assisting 17 student veterans during the semester, not including walk-ins or emergency sessions not typically on their caseload. The VRC has held four successful programs/events since the beginning of the semester:

Rededication, Financial Planning Workshop, and Women’s Veterans Outreach, and the Veterans Graduate Commencement Breakfast– STEM collaboration, bringing attention to and celebrating the 44 veterans student graduates who walked in the commencement ceremony this year. The VRC team continues to be active in community service as well, solidifying a partnership and volunteering time/service to the community action partnership/food bank (CAPS) which services the San Bernardino County area homeless citizen/demographic population.




SBVC UPDATE



