


### SBVC Launches New Apprenticeship Opportunities for Students

SBVC has recently partnered with the LAUNCH Apprenticeship Network to offer students real-world experience at a work site while they are enrolled in classes. Each apprenticeship lasts for one or two years, and students attend Career Technical Education (CTE) certificate/degree classes while working full-time in paid positions that correlate with their selected career pathway. The state covers tuition, leaving the student responsible for books and fees. Peggy Weber, SBVC's LAUNCH coordinator, says that this will allow even more students to earn a degree while adding real work experience to their resume. Employers can train students to meet their company's requirements and students can learn the process and culture of the company to see if it's a good fit. In January, SBVC launched its pilot apprenticeship program, partnering with Providence Group Healthcare for the licensed vocational nurse (LVN) to registered nurse (RN) pathway. SBVC is identifying companies to increase apprenticeship offerings in CTE programs. "It's an exciting opportunity," Weber says. "This puts qualified candidates back into the community to earn a sustainable living wage."



### SBVC Foundation Disburses \$270,000 in Emergency Aid Grants



The SBVC Foundation has continued to help students throughout the pandemic, providing assistance to hundreds of Wolverines. The Finish Line Scholars grant will make a major impact on the lives of hundreds of students by providing emergency financial aid grants. Made possible thanks to a \$150,000 charitable donation from the Jay Pritzker Foundation, \$20,000 from the Inland Empire Community Foundation, and \$100,000 from the SBVC Foundation, the funds are "intended to assist enrolled students, address any financial hardship that may impact their ability to stay enrolled and continue their studies," SBVC Foundation Interim Director Mike Layne said. About \$70,000 of the funding was used for undocumented students, who were not eligible to participate in CARES Act emergency assistance, and \$5,000 for student transfer fees. The Foundation expects to distribute 540 awards worth \$500 each by the end of spring.



### SBVC Students Contribute Perspectives to Campus Anti-Racism Committee

As a co-chair of the Committee on Equity, Inclusion & Anti-Racism, Associated Student Government President **Taylor DeBenedictis** is making sure that student ideas, thoughts, and concerns are voiced as the campus moves to enact change.

"At San Bernardino Valley College, the student population is minority-based and it's important that certain unique experiences are discussed," DeBenedictis says. "It's important we stay informed and do our best to create an environment for student success, and what should be at the forefront is what we're working on - talking about inclusion, anti-racism, and equity." DeBenedictis is on the committee's Events Planning work group, which focuses on the development of educational opportunities that get conversations started on inclusiveness, diversity, and equity.



### Theatre Arts Students Win Big at Virtual Kennedy Center Theater Festival



Even virtually, SBVC's Theater Arts students were able to dazzle the judges at this year's Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival. Seven students participated in the February event, and over the course of three days attended workshops and lectures, watched peer productions, and competed in festival competitions. **Pacifique Kabanda** was nominated for best costume design for the SBVC production of "Peter and the Starcatcher", and won three prizes at the festival: the DTM Smithsonian Student Membership Award, the Stagecraft Institute of Las Vegas Award, and the DTM Heart of the Art Award. Kabanda, **Alina Alvarez**, **Marlene Clara**, **Cynthia Ramirez**, and **Juan Villegas** also created a devised piece, "Unheard Voices" that was one of three pieces selected from the region to be presented at the festival.

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### **SBVC Art Department Reaches Global Audience**

By offering virtual presentations with writers, artists, and storytellers, the SBVC Art Department and IMA are able to reach a worldwide audience. In the fall, SBVC hosted two Zoom Artist Talks, and "both had more attendees than we might have had pre-pandemic on campus," Prof. Mandi Batalo, chair of the Art Department, says. "Yousef Ragheb spoke from Egypt and some of his students in Cairo joined us for the Art Talk." This spring, the Art Department presented two free online events: a creative writing presentation with Tamiko Nimura and a conversation on digital storytelling with artist Edward Gunawan. "We do not have many opportunities to meet one another in person these days, and virtual events like this can help to maintain social connections and build artistic community," Batalo says. "It's also wonderful that people from all over the country and around the world can participate and contribute to meaningful discussions."
