Two items do have to complete in order to start the application process: FAFSA Application/CA Dream Act Summer Bridge Program Deadline is August 1st for this year. Benefits: 2 years of free college tuition Free textbooks Access to laptops Student commitment: 5 grift or college expenses Priority Bregistration And other items Student commitment: Full-time enrollment — 12 units or more Attend the summer bridge program Participate in workshops Make satisfactory academic progress (2.0 GPA) Our Outreach teams have been to the schools. 	One thing that was discussed was having a set of intake questions as a part of the onboarding process; the idea is to find out what they are really struggling with or where they need help.
	For example, "how certain are you about a major or a goal in college?" and they would answer, "certain or most-likely certain, etc." we can even ask about food insecurities in a nice way. That way we can touch bases with our students during our
	30 minute session and follow through.
